We invite you to join us for the 11th annual Nurturing Developing Minds Conference. This conference is presented by Children's Hospital of Greenville Health System's (GHS) Division of Developmental-Behavioral Pediatrics and the Bradshaw Institute for Community Child Health & Advocacy, in collaboration with the South Carolina Leadership Education in Neurodevelopmental Disabilities (SC LEND) program. The theme of the conference this year is: Addressing the Challenges of Adversity.

Nurturing Developing Minds is a regional conference providing an interactive learning and networking opportunity for a broad inter-professional workforce. Plenary sessions feature national experts on child development and neurodevelopmental disabilities and interventions to support healthy child development. Breakout sessions focus on a broad range of topics related to child well-being and interventions to assist children who are struggling with adversity. for practical application to their daily work with children and families. Participants can expect to take away practical tools to use immediately in their work.

Keynote Speakers

Jeffrey P. Brosco, MD, PhD

Professor of Clinical Pediatrics, University of Miami Miller School of Medicine

Dr. Brosco completed his MD and a PhD in the history of medicine at the University of Pennsylvania. He served as chief resident after training in pediatrics at the University of Miami/Jackson Memorial Hospital, and he is board-certified in both Pediatrics and Developmental-Behavioral Pediatrics. He completed his tenure as a Robert Wood Johnson Generalist Faculty Scholar in 2003, and he continues to teach and practice both general pediatrics and developmental pediatrics.

Dr. Brosco's research includes an analysis of the history of health care for children in early 20th century Philadelphia, the historical epidemiology of intellectual disability, and the history of newborn screening in the U.S. With Diane Paul, he is co-author of "The PKU Paradox: A Short History of a Genetic Disease" (Johns Hopkins Press, 2013).

Dr. Brosco serves as Chair of the Pediatric Bioethics Committee at Jackson Memorial Hospital and Associate Director of the Mailman Center for Child Development. He has a leadership role in a variety of local, state and national health policy groups, including the Act Early State Workgroup (Florida/CDC, co-chair), Newborn Screening Translational Research Network (ACMG/NIH, co-chair of Steering Committee), and PKU Scientific Review Conference (NIH, co-chair of Long-term Outcomes and Management Across the Lifespan workgroup). In 2016, Dr. Brosco was appointed to the Advisory Committee on Heritable Disorders in Newborns and Children by the Secretary of Health and Human Services.

Lisa J. Chamberlain, MD, MPH

Associate Professor of Pediatrics and Director of the Stanford Advocacy Track, Stanford University School of Medicine

Dr. Chamberlain is an Associate Professor of Pediatrics at Lucile Packard Children's Hospital at Stanford. She cares for patients in East Palo Alto at the Ravenswood Family Health Center. She founded and is the medical director of the Stanford Pediatric Advocacy Program which oversees community pediatrics and advocacy training for all pediatric residents at Stanford.

In 2005, she founded the Stanford Advocacy Track (StAT) that supports a subset of residents interested in pursuing careers to address child health inequity in the U.S. and abroad. At the Stanford University School of Medicine she directs the Scholarly Concentration in Community Health, an area of scholarly focus for medical students interested in health disparities. She is a frequent lecturer in a wide range of settings at Stanford and teaches a popular course on the social and environmental determinants of health.

For her work in medical student and resident education, she has received two of Stanford's highest teaching awards. She also was the inaugural recipient of the Institute of Medicine as a Profession's Physician Merit Award in 2008 and the Academic Pediatric Association's Advocacy Award in 2009.

Her research examines access to care for impoverished children in California, focusing on children with chronic illness.

David W. Willis, MD, FAAP

Director, Division of Home Visiting and Early Childhood Systems (DHVECS) Maternal Child Health Bureau Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) U.S. Department of Health and Human Services

Dr. Willis joined the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) Maternal Child Health Bureau in July 2012 as director of the Division of Home Visiting and Early Childhood Services. Programs under his leadership include: Maternal, Infant, and Early Childhood Home Visiting Program, Early Childhood Comprehensive Systems Impact Grants Program, Home Visiting Collaborative Innovation and Improvement Network, and the Home Visiting Applied Research Collaborative (HARC).

Boarded in Pediatrics and Behavioral-Developmental Pediatrics, Dr. Willis was a clinician for 30 years and a long-standing early-childhood leader in Oregon and nationally before coming to HRSA. He was a Harris Mid-Career Fellow with ZERO TO THREE, past President of the Oregon Pediatric Society, an executive member of the American Academy of Pediatrics' Section on Early Education and Child Care, the first Chair the AAP's Board's Early Brain & Child Development Strategic Initiative and a previous member of Dr. Jack Shonkoff's Frontiers for Innovation at Harvard's Center for the Developing Child.
